### **Harvest Project 2022**

Every year at Harvest time, we have an appeal to support a charity which is meeting a current serious humanitarian need. The PCC have endorsed the Missions team proposal, that this year we would focus on disabled children in Ukraine.

Ukraine, as is also the case for much of Eastern Europe (EE), has, as a legacy from Soviet days, avoided the issue of disability, even pretending it is not there. Disabled children end up hidden at home, usually a small apartment up many floors, or placed in an institution, usually grim and providing little hope. The Ukrainian government is seeking to remedy this long term but has other matters distracting attention.

A charity 'Child Aid to Eastern Europe' (<a href="www.ChildAidee.org.uk">www.ChildAidee.org.uk</a>) seeks to provide homes and support. Child aid was formed in 1973, but then called 'Aid to Russian Christians'. After the end of the Soviet Union it became 'Child Aid EE' working with children in Belarus, Moldova and Ukraine. The PCC and Mission team agreed to focus on Ukraine and disabled children, including in particular the Little Lighthouse project in Makariv, just West of Kyiv and close to Bucha (the place of many alleged war crimes). It was involved in the early fighting but work has now recommenced. It provides services and help for disabled children and their families; help not normally available outside very limited facilities in Kyiv. The work is carried out by partners and the local Baptist church (the main protestant denomination in Ukraine – and much of eastern Europe).

In summary, the Harvest project is:

Child Care EE's work with disabled children in Ukraine including the Little Lighthouse in Makariv. This gives some flexibility e.g. if fighting engulfs Makariv and if specific work has to move.

The Church will collect donations, and also the Gift Aid on those donations for those who have filled in a Gift Aid form. We will collect cash and cheques at the Sunday services on 2<sup>nd</sup> 9<sup>th</sup> 16<sup>th</sup> and 23<sup>rd</sup> October (specifically 16<sup>th</sup> is the Harvest festival). ### Thought for the month by Chris Selden:

#### Dissatisfaction

I saw a TV programme this month in which two musicians were reflecting on touring and their life in the industry. They had known world-wide fame in the 1960's and 70s, and talked about the difficulties of transitioning from local gigs to world tours, life in hotel rooms, and how you feel as a person between concerts (when there isn't a crowd screaming how great you are). They also reflected on how common it is at the height of fame for solo musicians to think it would be better to be in a band, while members of a band think it would be better as a solo musician. It reminded me of the old saying that "the grass is always greener on the other side of the fence". I usually think of that phrase as a warning against envy; that specific desire to have (or take) something that we see someone else has – but I think it has something more to offer us. We people have complex emotions, and we also have the ability to understand our circumstances and situations; we can imagine possible futures (cue the success of romance or science-fiction novels). This is wonderful for creativity and driving 'human progress' – but it also creates a huge potential for personal dissatisfaction (which if unchecked can spiral into depression and other conditions). Such dissatisfaction doesn't only come from wanting something that we see someone else having; it can brew if we imagine a different life. We may find ourselves thinking "My life would be better if it wasn't for..." – and however we might finish the sentence, the risk is that we end up resenting something precious that we do have in our lives, because we think it prevents us from having some imagined life that we think would be so much better for us. The potential is that we resent aspects of our life rather than being grateful that we have them – opportunities, capabilities - even people. The Bible warns us against such thinking, reminding us to be thankful for the things we have in our life. Consider 1 Thessalonians 5:18: "Give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you." We must not let our current circumstances make us resentful of things which are actually good for us; we must not let desire for things we might want replace our thankfulness for the things we have. Yes, we will continue to pray for things which are causing us concern in our lives (or in the lives of others) – but we must ensure that such prayers are aligned with God's will rather than our own current reactions.

Philippians 4: 6-7 shows this balance, which is the way to finding God's peace in our lives: "Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus."
